8:15 – 9:00 am - Learn how to do a proper Accident Investigation

- This session will focus on the basics of conducting an accident investigation at your workplace. Attendees will learn the importance of performing accident investigations, tools to prepare for an investigation, and how to determine the root cause of accidents to prevent future incidents. Some of the core principles you will learn include the following:
 - The difference between an incident and accident
 - Goals of conducting an accident investigation
 - Methodology of performing an incident investigation
 - Washington State requirements for accident reporting and investigation
 - Services available to assist you with creating your own investigation process

$8:15-9:00~{\rm am}$ - Using the right tool to speed up your permitting with Marina and Boatyard projects

Tighter regulations and increased regulatory scrutiny continue to make marina and boatyard activities difficult to implement and expensive, with long permit timelines. A number of strategies can be employed to move through the permitting process faster and control costs. Topics will include:

- Maintenance dredging
 - How to get approval for open-water disposal of dredge material (least expensive option)
 - Strategies for planning maintenance dredging on a fixed budget
- Structure maintenance (Marine Floats will co-present here)
 - Strategies to limit habitat mitigation and other permit requirements for structure maintenance, rehabilitation, and replacement
 - Dock, float, and pile material selection based on permitting requirements
 - o Repair of breakwater/armored shorelines and planning for sea level rise
